Our AGM was held on May 2024 and this is a short updated version. (The full report appears online).

We can't operate as a council without our hardworking members, and we are delighted that Colin, Olive, Mark, Ed and our newest member Joe remain with us as we thank outgoing councillor Adam, which leaves us with one spare seat if you'd like to join us!

Unlike most parish councils, we have no buildings, so our focus this year has been very much on restoring nature and we've made efforts to plant trees, support a reduction in poison use (so that

our swifts and other insect eating birds will have food), and we're investigating a '20's Plenty' traffic calming scheme which would help with air pollution among other things.

We're delighted to be supporting HDC with their Wildways plans to link nature corridors through the town. Most similar projects in the UK go around the towns, but with continued building we now need to bring nature back through the town centres too, so we have

supported residents with planters and allotment groups with water capture, removal of pesticides, and are similarly offering support to our schools to create healthier environments for nature and the children to live happily together. We have sponsored a Pollination Education Station for Trafalgar Infant school in partnership with the Horsham Wildways Project and Sussex Green Living charity.

I very much want to thank everyone for giving up so much of their precious free time to attend so many meetings and events. Between us, we continue to liaise with local groups for the youth, for the elderly, the police, planning, and many other groups.

There are also four pubs which host an increasing number of community activities and our two local churches which support the community in so many ways.

Our District/Ward Councillors for HDC are Tony Frankland who has been newly appointed to the role of Cabinet Member for Performance, Customer Service and Communications, and the leader of Horsham District Council, Martin Boffey. We are very lucky that he manages to juggle all his many responsibilities to fit us in!

We have organised a memorial bench for a local resident at the Rec and two new noticeboards. Some of the bins were replaced, but sadly they're not fox proof so the problems with littering and fouling continue.

There's certainly a lot to do, but what a team!

As a community we like to celebrate all the good in Trafalgar and residents were invited to make nominations for the Leonard Crosbie Community Awards which were approved by Mrs Mary Crosbie. This year's winners are:-

• INDIVIDUAL AWARD •

Ann Turner – for instigating and leading The Friends of the Rec group (FREC), since spring 2020 and helping acquire several new trees, bulbs and a picnic table installed in 2023. Ann also helps with Holy Trinity Church Gardening Club; with the Holy Trinity Church Cleaning and organises the social group Trinity Ladies. She is the prompt and makes the tea each week for the Trinity Church Players; she helps with Trinity Tots and knits items for premature babies.

Ann has only lived in the area for a few years but has thrown herself into community projects with contagious enthusiasm and resilience, embracing others with her kindness, chuckles and chat.

• GROUP AWARD •

Second Horsham Scouts on Swindon Road - for providing so many young people with a healthy, fun and positive focus for all age groups.

• BUSINESS AWARD •

Tony Kneale runs a unique reliable highly recommended local car mechanic business of at least 30 years standing in Victory Rd.

• INDIVIDUAL CLIMATE & ECOLOGY AWARD •

Hannah Urpeth as a parent, was hugely helpful in renovating the small allotment patches at Trafalgar Infant School and working (sometimes with the children) on a weekly basis in summer 2023. She also cleared, planted, watered and weeded the central courtyard area, almost single-handedly, and is now a learning support assistant and helping the school towards its green goals.

• GROUP CLIMATE & ECOLOGY AWARD •

Boldings Brook Conservation Group was founded in 1997 by a small band of interested Redford Avenue neighbours who take responsibility, in conjunction with Horsham District Council, for maintaining the free flow of water in the Brook and preserving the wildlife corridor from Warnham Nature Reserve along the Red River to Onion Island near Irwin Drive.

Regular work over almost 30 years has involved cutting back and composting overgrown vegetation from the brook and its banks, litter picking and wildlife surveys. One-off projects include the securing of a grant for the construction of the Millennium Bridge on the Riverside Walk in 2000.

Meeting once a month from September to March, work parties usually comprise around a dozen helpers. The group is led by Daphne Mitchell 01403 263640.

Twenty is Plenty

A big thank you to everyone who took part in our survey to understand the views of residents for a 20mph speed limit in the Horsham Trafalgar Neighbourhood Council (HTNC) area. The result was a resounding yes with 96% of just over 500 residents wanting to reduce the speed of traffic where they live.

As a result of this we have now applied to West Sussex County Council (WSCC) for a Community Highway Scheme. HTNC has pledged £1,200 towards the cost of the installation in support of the application. We await the outcome from WSCC which hopefully will be in November this year. If successful, the project will be put into the WSCC budget for completion in 2025/6.

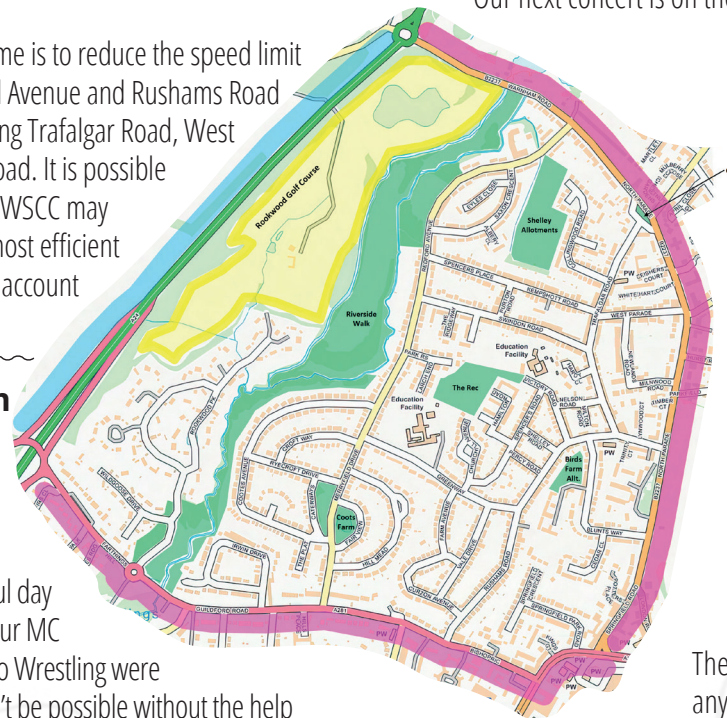
Just to remind you the proposed scheme is to reduce the speed limit to 20mph in Merryfield Drive, Redford Avenue and Rushams Road along with all associated roads including Trafalgar Road, West Parade, Blunts Way, and Milnwood Road. It is possible that after considering our application, WSCC may modify our proposals to provide the most efficient and effective scheme which takes into account current bus routes.

Update on Gatwick Expansion

HTNC supports maintaining Gatwick as it is, rather than building a second runway to enlarge it to become the size of Heathrow as is currently planned. Air pollution in Trafalgar already breaks two World Health Limits. (see addresspollution.org) The consultation has now closed and the findings will be sent to Louise Haigh, the Secretary of State for Transport, by the end of November. We wait to hear what her decision will be.

Horsham Trafalgar Neighbourhood Council- Comment on new National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF)

The new government's proposed National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) aims to increase local authority housing targets and reduce impediments to development.

The algorithms mean that in areas where house prices are more than four times the average earnings (like ours), more housebuilding will be required than elsewhere, so the Horsham District numbers would rise by around 40%.

Horsham needs to prove a five year supply of potential sites as well as finding extra offerings because there must be choice for the developers who want to buy land. If this doesn't happen, there's a penalty - having to identify even more land for development. In addition, Horsham District is required to build out extra houses for Crawley, Arun, and Adur and Worthing Districts, because of their protected National Landscapes.

No mention is made of those developers who have already bought land but who have 'banked it' to keep prices high. Neither has any reference to water neutrality been made. Development on green belt will become easier and sadly, the 2021 government's Dasgupta Report conclusion, "...nature, and the biodiversity that underpins it, ultimately sustains our economies, livelihoods and well-being" has no mention. Previous references to creating "beautiful places" have been removed, while another new rule requires authorities to identify places where "laboratories, giga factories, data centres, digital infrastructure, freight and logistics" can be built.

Thankfully because HDC managed to get the Local Plan agreed swiftly, we are hopefully spared these new rules for a few years.

So how will all this affect Trafalgar going ahead? It is likely that taller buildings will be necessary, and the pressure to build on Rookwood Golf Course may arise again.

Primary and Junior School Places

Applications are now open for children who start in reception at primary and infant schools across West Sussex in September 2025.

The quickest and easiest way to apply is online via School places - West Sussex County Council and the deadline for applications is 15 January 2025. Children born between 1 September 2020 and 31 August 2021 are eligible to start school next September.

Children who are currently in Year 2 at an infant school will also need to apply for a place to start a junior school in September next year.

The Wall at Springfield Park

Because of the nature of the old stones, a specific type of mortar must be used, but this can't be applied in cold, wet conditions, so restoring the wall will unfortunately not be possible before the spring. Our ward Councillor Anthony Frankland is in touch with the agent and he is also in discussions with Springfield Park residents and WSCC who are responsible for the path whilst the work is on hold. Sadly, with their backlog of potholes and other work, progress is slow.
